He has extensive experience in mediation, facilitation and training, as well as policy and program development. Dan is an approved Parenting Act mediator and is trained and experienced in facilitating Specialized ADR cases involving domestic intimate partner abuse, unresolved parental conflict, or child abuse and neglect. Dan holds a Bachelor's degree in Law, Politics and Society (LPS) and Sociology from Drake University (IA) and earned his Master's in Conflict Resolution and Reconciliation from Abilene Christian University (TX). He served on the Board of Directors of the Iowa Association of Mediators and Nebraska Mediation Association, and was a member of the Iowa Family Law Case Processing Reform Task Force. Prior to joining Concord Mediation Center, Dan owned and managed Southwest Iowa Mediation Services, LLC, in southwest Iowa. At Southwest Iowa Mediation Services, Dan developed and provided a full range of mediation services and trainings in family law, elder decision making and care, civil disputes, employment, and organization conflict.

## Presenter Bios

### Cyntoia Brown-Long

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Cyntoia Brown-Long is an author, speaker, and advocate for criminal justice reform and victims of trafficking. Cyntoia had a difficult start in life. She was born to an alcoholic, teenage mother who was a victim of sex trafficking. Cyntoia experienced a sense of isolation, low self-esteem, and alienation that drove her straight into the hands of a predator. Cyntoia was trafficked during her early teenage years and, at the age of 16, was arrested for killing a man who solicited her for sex. She was tried as an adult and was sentenced to life in prison without the chance of parole for 51 years. Her trafficker was never arrested. In prison, Cyntoia's life took a dramatic turn when the prison education principal took her under her wing and introduced her to a spiritual path. She encouraged her to build a positive life in prison and to resist the negative influences that lead to despair. Cyntoia's journey was a roller coaster ride that included a documentary about her life, a profound encounter with God, an unlikely romance, and, eventually, a commuted sentence by Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam. She received unprecedented national and international support from social media advocates, pastors, and celebrities and was released from prison in Nashville, TN, on August 7, 2019. Her memoir, *Free Cyntoia: My Search for Redemption in the American Prison System* (Atria Books), written while in prison, documents her early years and the 15 years she was incarcerated and takes readers on a coming-of-age spiritual journey. Set against the shocking backdrop of a life behind bars and the injustice of sentencing sex-trafficked juveniles as adults, Cyntoia struggled to overcome a legacy of birth-family addiction and a lifetime of being ostracized and abandoned by society. Of her time in prison, Cyntoia says, "I was just a teenager when I was sent to live behind a razor-wire fence. My entire coming of age was within the walls of the Tennessee Prison for Women." She was a 2020 Nominee for the NCAAP Literary Image Award and has been featured as a guest columnist for the *Washington Post*. Cyntoia hopes her story will not only inspire others but also shine a light on the injustice many people still face on a daily basis, especially the injustice to women and children in American prisons. She, with her husband, Jaime, is the founder of the Foundation for Justice, Freedom, and Mercy. In January of 2020 the Vera Institute of Justice recognized Cyntoia as one of the Best of Justice Reform honorees. As a thought leader for legislative and societal reform, Cyntoia is available to speak to a wide variety of organizations. Her recent keynote appearances include presentations at Georgetown Law School for The Janet Reno Forum, Broward County Children's Services, the Ohio Attorney General Office's Human Trafficking Summit, and the State of Louisiana's Anti-Trafficking Initiative hosted by First Lady and Governor Edwards. Cyntoia has been nominated for the Juvenile Law Center 2022 Leadership Prize and is currently the Assistant Director of The Center for Business as Mission at Lipscomb University College of Business in Nashville.

### Hannah Burdess

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Hannah is an active member of the Dodge County Youth Voice Chapter where she is a passionate advocate for youth and young adults. Hannah's advocacy experience includes Nebraska Juvenile Justice Association Presenter 2021 and Heartland Juvenile Services Association Presenter 2022. Hannah's personal experience has made her passionate about assisting professionals in how to authentically engage with youth and young adults. Hannah is a junior at the University of Nebraska Omaha where she is majoring in criminal justice and pursuing a career in law enforcement.

### Dr. Abby Carbaugh

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Dr. Abby Carbaugh is currently the Data Administrator for Douglas County's Juvenile Justice Initiative. She graduated from the University of Nebraska Omaha in 2013 with her doctorate in Criminal Justice, with focus areas of institutional corrections, research methods, and quantitative data analysis. In her dissertation, she used propensity score matching to examine the effectiveness of parole supervision. In 2012, she was hired by the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services to serve as the agency's Research Manager, and subsequently promoted to Research Administrator, then Research Director. In these positions, she played a key role in implementing and monitoring the performance of newly adopted risk and need assessments and classification tools, collaborating with external research partners, evaluating the effectiveness of clinical and non-clinical programs, and measuring the degree to which operational changes produced their intended effects. In her current role with Douglas County, Dr. Carbaugh partners with a number of agencies and organizations to collect and analyze data about at risk, system-involved, and non-system-involved youth, with the goal of using these research findings as the basis for future decision-making. She is also working to establish standardized and comprehensive data tracking systems to increase data transparency and accessibility.

### Dr. Megan Davidson

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Dr. Megan Davidson has over 10 years of experience conducting applied research in the public sector, with specific content expertise in the juvenile/adult justice systems, behavioral health system, and child welfare system, as well as the intersectionality of these systems. In her role as Director at OMNI, Megan manages teams of researchers to develop and implement applied research and evaluation projects across these content areas. In addition to working on complex projects across the country, Megan has cultivated a substantial body of work in Omaha, Nebraska (where she currently resides) focused around enhancing the juvenile justice system responses to behavioral health issues as well as community-wide responses to youth and family needs. Other key areas of expertise for Megan involve supporting with the development and evaluation of Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) programs, co-responder programs, and problem-solving courts- all of which involve a partnership between the criminal justice and behavioral health systems. She is also part of the Nebraska Collaborative for Violence Intervention and Prevention (NeCVIP), which seeks to address the factors contributing to gun violence and violent injury.

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Adolphus Graves currently serves as the Court Administrator for the Cobb County Juvenile Court; a suburban metro-Atlanta jurisdiction in Georgia, with approximately 750,000 residents. He previously held the role of Directory of Probation Services for the Fulton County Juvenile Court, which encompasses the city of Atlanta and multiple county municipalities. Adolphus is a dedicated public servant with over two decades of continuous professional advancement in court administration and probation service arenas. He currently serves on Georgia's Juvenile Justice State Advisory Group and in 2019 was appointed to the Federal Advisory Committee on Juvenile Justice for the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Adolphus is committed to contributing to the overall efficiency and efficacy of juvenile and criminal justice systems as demonstrated by his history of work with numerous rural and urban jurisdictions across the nation. He consistently promotes organizational adherence to evidence-based principles and multisystem integration efforts that include maximizing community stakeholder engagement. For over 8 years, she was Executive Director for the Nebraska Foster Care Review Office, an independent State agency responsible for the oversight of all children placed in out-of-home care. ### Michelle Paxton

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Michelle Paxton joined Nebraska Law in April, 2017 to create and lead the newest clinical program, the Children's Justice Clinic (CJC). Previously Ms. Paxton served as the Director of Legal Training at University of Nebraska's Center on Children, Families, and the Law (CCFL). Through her work at CCFL, she came to realize that effective advocacy in juvenile court requires both an understanding of the law and appreciation of the complex dynamics of children, families, and stakeholders comprising the child welfare system. Ms. Paxton initiated the University of Nebraska College of Law and CCFL's partnership to create a new clinical program wherein law students develop the knowledge and skills necessary to effectively advocate for young children utilizing the training, support, and consultation from experts at CCFL. The CJC's impact in her local community prompted Ms. Paxton to explore opportunities to ensure all children and families have access to high-quality representation in juvenile court. Ms. Paxton secured additional funding from private foundations to launch the Children's Justice Attorney Education program. This new program targets attorneys in rural communities interested in working in juvenile court.

### Peggy Reisher

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Peggy Reisher has worked in the field of brain injury for over 25 years. She helped establish the Brain Injury Alliance of Nebraska (BIA-NE) in 2009 and became the executive director in July 2013. BIA-NE's mission is to create a better future for all Nebraskans through brain injury prevention, education, advocacy, and support.
